Subject: Assembly Bill (AB) 1012 Cycle Six "Use It or Lose It" Notification

This correspondence serves as the official notification to Regional agencies for the sixth cycle of the "Use It or Lose It" provisions contained in AB 1012. Agencies are required to obligate federal funds within 3 years of receiving the apportionments. Sixth cycle balances subject to potential reprogramming on November 1, 2005, total \$119 million: Congestion Mitigation and Air Quality Improvement Program (CMAQ) - \$40 million, Regional Surface Transportation Program (RSTP) - \$68 million, and Regional Transportation Enhancement Activities Program (R-TEA) - \$11 million. Balances are as of September 30, 2004. Regions may check the enclosed tables for specific CMAQ, RSTP, or R-TEA balances. The sixth cycle notification assumes that all fifth cycle funds, subject to reprogramming, will be obligated, extended, or reprogrammed. Therefore, no fifth cycle funds, subject to potential reprogramming, are included in the sixth cycle amounts.

The unobligated balances shown on the enclosed charts do not include Federal Fiscal Year (FFY) 2005 apportionments, actual FFY 2004 apportionments (only the advanced FFY 2004 apportionments are included), or rescissions or additional adjustments to FFY 2004 apportionments or unobligated balances. Cycle Six charts will be updated when this information becomes available.

Regional agencies are also required to submit a plan to the California Department of Transportation (Department) to obligate any balance older than 2 years and to ensure that none of the apportionment balances reach 3 years of age. Obligation plans are due to the Department's District Local Assistance Engineer's no later than May 1, 2005. The obligation plans will also be used to determine Obligation Authority (OA) needs for the remainder of the federal fiscal year, review, prioritize, and track projects, and plan workload. As a result, the format is being revised to better meet these needs. The revised obligation plan format and instructions will be distributed under separate cover within the next 2 months.

Please note, we are still waiting for the new Federal Transportation Act to be enacted. Until this occurs, we anticipate receiving continuing resolutions throughout the year. These continuing resolutions will provide a limited amount of OA and apportionments. Currently, we have received \$137 million in formula funds OA (roughly equivalent to 51 days of the projected annual total) for local agency use. We anticipate receiving approximately 8 month's of FFY 2005 apportionments soon. We will provide updated information as soon as it becomes available.

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There is a total of \$11 million of R-TEA funds subject to reprogramming for Cycle Six. Per: the California Transportation Commission Resolution G-03-13, "any Transportation Enhancement Activities (TEA) projects programmed or allocated with the Intermodal Surface Transportation Efficiency Act or the Transportation Equity Act for the 21st Century era, Federal enhancement funds will continue to be administered under the separate Federal Enhancement TEA program as outlined in Commission Resolution G-98-20 until the projects are constructed or lapse their funds due to timely use of funds issues".
